Restrictive practices

- ‘Everyday practices’
- Atmosphere, culture, environment
- Physical, procedural, relational



Physical restrictions

“The fences, locks, personal alarms and so on that keep people safe” ¹



Procedural restrictions

“The policies and procedures in place to maintain safety and security”¹



Relational restrictions

“The knowledge and understanding of patients and the environment, and the translation of information into appropriate responses and care” ¹



Restrictive interventions

- Restraint
- Seclusion
- Segregation



Restraint

- Physical
- Mechanical
- Chemical



Seclusion

“The placement of a patient alone in a locked room that has been specifically designed for this purpose”²



Segregation

“A situation where, in order to reduce a sustained risk of harm posed by the patient to others, a patient should not be allowed to mix freely with other patients on a long-term basis” ^{3,4}



Challenges...

- Language and definitions ⁵
- Seclusion/segregation – a matter of time/place? ⁵
- Night time confinement – all in a name? ⁵



‘Least restrictive’...?

- Objective/subjective ^{5,6}
- Cultural differences, practices and norms ^{5,6}
- Impacts and effects ^{5,6}



“Always question if you can do something else that would interfere less with a person’s basic rights and freedoms”⁴
